

### Welcome to the September / October 2015 Edition

#### RECENT BIRD REPORTS

**September – October Weather:** the first ten days of September were dominated by high pressure in the Atlantic bringing northerly winds which doubtless encouraged migrants to leave. By mid-month wet and windy weather had arrived, typical of the autumn equinox, with mostly south-westerly or westerly winds. Finally an anticyclone brought fine sunny weather with cooler nights. October was a mixed bag firstly with a northerly airstream, cool and often overcast, followed by a southerly airstream with some autumn warmth and more sunshine; rainfall was low overall.

**VELVET SCOTER\*** Oct: Grafham Water 3 female/immatures from 26<sup>th</sup> to the end of the month. **GANNET Sept:** Fen Drayton Lakes a juvenile flyover on 26<sup>th</sup>. Oct: Paxton Pits a flyover on 13<sup>th</sup>, Nene Washes a juvenile on 15<sup>th</sup>.

**PURPLE HERON\*** Sept: Grafham Water a flyover on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**SPOONBILL** Oct: Paxton Pits a juvenile on  $20^{th} - 21^{st}$ .

**ROUGH-LEGGED BUZZARD\*** Oct: Ouse Washes a juvenile on  $15^{th}$ , Holme Fen on  $17^{th}$ , Wicken Fen and Burwell Fen on  $19^{th} - 20^{th}$ , Six Mile Bottom on  $21^{st}$ , Grafham Water on  $26^{th}$ .

**GREY PHALAROPE\*** Sept: Burwell Fen on 17<sup>th</sup> – 18<sup>th</sup>; 50 records up to 2013.

**LESSER SPOTTED WOODPECKER Oct:** Fowlmere NR one amongst a tit flock on 15<sup>th</sup>. *An increasingly scarce species in Cambs; in 2005 there were 27 records including 3 – 4 breeding records.* 

**WOODLARK\*** Oct: Grafham Water a flyover on 31<sup>st</sup>.

**YELLOW-BROWED WARBLER\*** Sept: Paxton Pits on 26<sup>th</sup>. Oct: Witchford on 4<sup>th</sup>, King's Ripton on 5<sup>th</sup>, Kingfishers Bridge on 6<sup>th</sup>, Ferry Meadows CP on 12<sup>th</sup>; only 12 records up to 2013.

**HAWFINCH** Sept: Monks Wood a flyover on 23<sup>rd</sup>; with only 4 records in 2013 and 2 in 2014, this remains a rare bird in Cambridgeshire.

#### Other records

The records in this bulletin are unchecked and may be revised at a later date. An asterisk after the name of the species indicates that it is necessary to send a description to the County Recorder before the record will be accepted. Some species are 'reported from' to give an indication of distribution. Some entries (particularly wildfowl) have maxima given when a number of counts have been received. Where no numbers are given the record relates to single birds.

#### Cormorants, egrets and herons, and grebes

**Cormorant Sept:** Fen Drayton Lakes 82 on  $8^{th}$ . **Oct:** Ferry Meadows 33 on  $26^{th}$ . **Shag Sept:** Grafham Water a juvenile on  $1^{st} - 2^{nd}$ , Paxton Pits an adult on  $10^{th}$ .

Osprey Sept: Grafham Water on 2<sup>nd</sup>, Wicken Fen on 12<sup>th</sup>, Maxey GP on 20<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>. Oct: Stirtloe GP a juvenile roosting on 6<sup>th</sup>, Maxey area a flyover on 22<sup>nd</sup>, the latest date.

Readers are reminded that the Club is trying to identify pairs with young; for this purpose descriptions are very useful (concentrate on the bustles) and best of all a photograph. Hard to find Song Thrush or Mistle Thrush this year. Swallows well down, House Martins 9 probable maybe more as some started late, Swifts not an actual count but probably 8+.

#### From the Editor

#### **Royston Crows**

Following James Parry's most interesting talk on Emma Turner (9<sup>th</sup> October) I was prompted to get out and read again my old copy of Bird Watching on Scolt Head, a fascinating account of the birds of Scolt Head in the 1920s. Much of the book is devoted to the nesting terns but, to me, the most remarkable section was her description of the sheer numbers of Hooded Crows which passed over Scolt in the Autumn compared with today. I quote:

"By far the most impressive sight throughout October 1925 was the passing of the Hooded Crows...the steady purposeful flight of the grey crows, day after day and week after week, filled one with awe and wonder. It seemed as if no power on earth could stop them, neither did adverse winds dismay them.

"During the last three weeks of October hooded crows passed over Scolt Head Island in incredible numbers. Every day they waked me at dawn....Perhaps only a few crows would be moving, but sometimes they passed the hut in one continuous stream until you might have thought that the world contained no other bird but the hooded crow. They travelled in parties of from seven to twenty, with short intervals between the parties. As dawn broke you saw the long line of them. They first appeared in sight over the woods four miles eastwards. They were never in a hurry. Slowly and steadily, with long rhythmic beating of the wings they travelled from east to west, keeping almost entirely to the line of the sandhills and so passing directly over the hut in which I lived....Hundreds of thousands must have passed me in those three weeks, for although on most days the greater movement was between dawn and 10 a.m. yet sometimes migration continued

from dawn to dusk. Apparently the great influx of 1925 was above the average, for the fishermen said they had never seen such numbers. Whence they came and whither were they going?"

Clearly at that time hooded crows were common birds in the autumn and winter; today they are exceptional and one is lucky to see one even in Norfolk where they were regular, if not common, when I was a boy. So why are they so rare now? Presumably they originated from Scandinavia and Eastern Europe where, to the casual visitor, they are still quite common. Has there really been a great decline in their numbers and, if so, where and why or have they altered their migratory habits? There is no clue in Emma Turner's book but it, nevertheless, describes many dramatic changes in the birdlife of Scolt which are difficult to comprehend in the relatively short span of much less than 100 years.

Footnote: the name Royston Crow originated in the 18th/19th century when they were very common among the flocks of sheep which populated the downs in the region of Royston. The name is still perpetuated in the name of the local newspaper and two hooded crows feature in the Royston Coat of Arms.

#### **Ethno-ornithology**

Air pollution, the speckling of Great Tit eggs, folk names for birds, and the role of grandparents in teaching about birds, were just three topics covered by Andy Gosler at the club's evening meeting on evening meeting on 11th September. These are all aspects of 'Ethno-ornithology' which sits within the broader compass of ethno-biology — the study of human reactions with nature. Not surprisingly, the branches of this subject head off in all directions, and Andy Gosler's talk was wideranging, intriguing and sometimes challenging. He opened with the apparently simple question 'why are we fascinated by birds?' We all have favourite species, based on behaviour, plumage, or maybe childhood memory. The last of these is a very common trigger, a particular species linked to a memory of a place or event. (This is certainly true in my case — the hard winter of 1963 when almost everything froze even in South London, but a single snipe huddled beside the last flowing water in an abandoned watercress bed, made a formative experience for an 11 year old).

We have become quite familiar with the pervasive influence of human activity on birdlife, and this was Andy's next topic. He drew on his work monitoring Great Tit next boxes at Wytham Woods in Oxfordshire, where he noticed that the amount of dark speckling on Great Tit eggs increased in areas of the wood with less calcareous soils. Tests showed that the speckling is found where the eggs are thinner and that this pigmentation also makes the shells stronger; the birds are compensating for a local calcium deficiency. Andy noted that the amount of specking increased

over 20 years, particularly in areas with calcareous soils; over the same period calcium levels in these soils were shown to have fallen, most probably due to acidification caused to industrial pollution. So there was an unexpected human impact on egg colouration.

The degree to which our forefathers associated with nature can be demonstrated by the study of folk names for birds. Andy gave over a large part of his talk to this area, and I can barely do justice to it here. Leading expert Michael Desfayes in 'A Thesaurus of Bird Names' (1998) identified over 100,000 folk names for birds in over 40 Indo-European languages; some demonstrate a detailed knowledge of bird behaviour, such as 'bottle bird' for Long-tailed Tit, referring to its nest. Generally the salience of a species (how often it pops into view or is heard) correlated with the number of local names recorded – 164 for the Wren compared to 2 for the Garden Warbler! Internationally, a decline in cultural diversity, exemplified by the disappearance of minority languages, is mirrored by the decline in biological diversity; might there common causes?

More broadly, Andy referred to what is known as "shifting baseline syndrome"; our growing disconnect with nature leads to inter-generational changes in our perception of the state of the environment. Each of us thinks back to what we knew as children (the baseline) but if each generation knows or experiences less, the baseline changes for the worse. The inference is that as a society if we are less connected with nature than previous generations, how can we make the right decisions regarding nature conservation?

And in terms of current knowledge, Andy painted a rather alarming picture. A survey of Oxford biology undergraduates revealed that only 42% could successfully identify five UK bird species (with a worse figure for butterflies). Those who had learnt their natural history from teachers were no better than the average, whilst those who learnt from a parent and or grandparent were 10-20% better than the median. The best performers were those students who were either self-taught or guided by a grandparent. (On later reflection it seemed to me that today's better optics and photography, better reference works and the power of the internet, should all support a better level of knowledge than that of previous generations. Perhaps today's situation is one of a deeper knowledge, shared by fewer people).

Linking these thought-provoking but apparently disparate ideas into a comprehensive theory of man / bird interactions seems rather difficult. But fortunately Andy Gosler and his colleagues have established an Ethno-ornithology World Archive which they see as "a space for knowledge of birds and people".
