RING-NECKED DUCK* Feb: Ouse Washes (Chain Corner) a drake on the 18th – 24th.

GREAT NORTHERN DIVER* Jan: Grafham Water on the 12th, presumably the December bird.

SLAVONIAN GREBE* Jan: Fen Drayton Lakes on the 13th – 14th.

ICELAND GULL Jan: Cottenham Long Drove on the 5th, then 2 at Waterbeach on 6th, Milton / Waterbeach a single on several subsequent dates, Ouse Washes on 14th. **Feb:** Grafham Water an immature on 4th and a 2 C.Y. on 14th, Cottenham Long Drove/Cambridge Research Park a 2 C.Y. on several dates, Nene Washes (March Farmers) a 2 C.Y. on 11th, Ouse Washes a 3 C.Y. on 18th.

ROUGH-LEGGED BUZZARD* Jan: two individuals, a female centred in the north near and around Thorney, and a male centred around the Holme / Woodwalton area. **Feb:** Wryde Croft Thorney on the 10th, Nene Washes on 17th.

GOSHAWK* Feb: Redmere (Littleport) on the 25th, an immature female seen with a Buzzard. **WILLOW TIT* Feb:** Redmere 2 on the 27th.

Other records

Records in this bulletin are unchecked and may be revised at a later date. Asterisks indicate species for which it is necessary to send a description to the County Recorder for records to be accepted. The term 'reported from' and 'also at' give an indication of distribution. Some species give maxima when a number of counts have been received. Where no numbers are given the record relates to a single bird.

Weather: the first few days of January were mixed but generally wet. A gale overnight on the 17th -18th caused local damage, and was followed a few days later by some snowfall. The final third remained guite variable. February continued this winter's pattern of days of cool, wet weather; a relatively mild mid-month gave way to a very cold spell at the end with easterly winds and snow.

Winter swans began to come here annually in the late 1940s; until then they had visited occasional and in small numbers; even in 1968 the maximum number of Whoopers was 19. This began to change in the 1970s and by the mid-1980s Bewick's came in their thousands, but Whoopers still only in hundreds. In February 1997 for example the count of Bewick's on both washes combined was 1881 and of Whoopers just 85. By 2008, just ten years ago, Bewick's numbers were still much the same at 1749 yet Whoopers had gone up markedly to 2219. So, while Whooper numbers have stayed at the levels of ten years ago, Bewick's have declined. In addition to this global decline, in some winters many stay further east on the flyway. PB/CGB

Club Research in 2017 -18

Last year we launched two research projects, on Sand Martins and the single day Raptors watch. Results for Sand Martins were a little thin but the response for Raptors was excellent; the initial findings are set out below but I will carry out further analyses and report again.

Raptor Survey 16th September 2017

The southern part of the county was well covered, northern and Fenland areas less so. The weather on the day was windy with some heavy showers, and several observers reported that they would have expected to see more on a better day.

The Common Buzzard was the species most often recorded. Several observations could well have related to family groups. The results give hard evidence of the spread of Buzzards in the last couple of decades, something that seems to be increasingly controversial.

The same applies to the Red Kite. There were fewer observations in the south than I would have expected. In my part of the county, the north-west, it is the most frequently seen bird of prey. I was delighted that Kestrels were recorded by several observers throughout the county. Some Hobbies were still present and it was pleasing that a good number of Sparrowhawks were seen. One observer saw a Peregrine which interacted briefly with a family of five Buzzards.

The heartening aspect of the day was that it demonstrated that we have a healthy range of raptors in the county, a welcome contrast to the situation 50 years ago. Yet there are threats apparent. I am frequently told that there are "too many" Kites; that there reintroduction is "interfering with nature". We need to keep the situation monitored so I would like to repeat the survey on a regular twice yearly basis. I hope you were able to take part on the (previously announced) spring date, 24th March 2018.

Sand Martins

I had far fewer responses for the Sand Martin Survey but the Nene Park Trust gave me access to some impressive ringing work. I hope to be able to link this with surveys elsewhere and produce some meaningful results.

Part of the problem is that colonies of Sand Martins are naturally ephemeral. Many of the sites they choose are on unstable land. It has also been said that parasites build up in the nest to such an extent that after a few years the site becomes untenable. My own experience reflected the short term aspects of the colonies. The site at Town Bridge Peterborough has now been abandoned, probably because it is next to a major redevelopment. A report was received that there was a colony of 40 birds in the quarry east of the Bedford Purlieus forest. I visited in late July and saw some superb Silver Washed and Dark Green Fritillaries but no Martins. I also failed to find the colony at Kings Dyke; plenty of birds were feeding but I could not find the nests – very frustrating!

Research Projects for 2018

Sand Martins. I would like to repeat the 2017 survey. I hope the Nene Park Trust will share their ringing results again and that there are few more reports from elsewhere in the county. So if you spot a Sand Martin colony could you report, in addition to the grid ref, date and time,

- The number of nests.
- The nature of the ground the colony was in "active sand quarry" or such.

In addition, if any of you have any additional information for 2017, could you forward it to me? It may be a link to another source. I'm particularly interested in the colonies at Sutton North Fen, Kingfishers Bridge and the elusive Kings Dyke.

Grey Wagtails - New for 2018!

Why are Grey Wagtails of specific interest? It's to do with their range and distribution which has fluctuated and is enigmatic. John Clare wrote of "little trotty wagtail" (perhaps not his best line) but he would not have been seeing Greys. Until the middle of the 19th century they were mainly confined to upland areas with fast flowing streams. About then they began to expand their range north and west in Europe and to the east in Britain. The first confirmed breeding in Cambridgeshire was in 1935 and in Huntingdonshire in 1955. I never used to see them along the Nene in the 1960s. This changed in the 1990s and I suspected they were breeding in several areas. Since then, they seem to have retreated but this is all subjective and hence the need for a survey.

The methodology will have two parts. The first relates to the breeding season. The Wagtails need steep banks to nest in. They also favour fast moving water, ideally fringed by deciduous trees. In Cambridgeshire, this in the main restricts them to locks and weirs. So, do you have a lock or a weir near you that you could survey over the breeding season? Ideally, it would be helpful if you could visit the site every three weeks or so, but more or less frequent visits would still be valuable. It's a matter of trying to get a picture of where the birds are breeding in 2018. The check list is

- The location with a grid reference and type of habitat
- The date and time of your visit, and weather conditions.
- The number of birds present.
- If possible the age and gender of the birds.
- Their behaviour, and any evidence of breeding or attempted breeding.

Wagtails have a long breeding season, lasting from late March to the end of August so this phase of the survey covers the period from 17/3/18 to 1/9/18. Are you up for this? I know it sounds a lot but, come on, it will just add a bit of zest to a nice walk by the river!

If it does appeal, please let me know <u>as soon as possible</u> which locks or weirs you would like to survey. I have some volunteers for the Nene so far (and a press gang out for a couple of others) but nobody at present for the south. The chalk streams in this area might also be of interest.

The second aspect of the survey is more casual. Grey Wagtails appear to be both long and short range migrants. They seem to disperse from the breeding sites in autumn, but the range of non-breeding habitats mentioned as "suitable" is vague. I for one saw a juvenile Wagtail apparently happily living for several weeks alongside a minor road with very little water at all. Hence, it would be interesting to see where they are in Cambridgeshire outside the breeding season. So, if you see a Grey Wagtail between 2/9/18 and 31/3/19 could you report it?

PLUS.....Reports of Wiffwaffs wanted -Tony Fulford writes:

"I am extremely grateful for members helping me locate Wiffwaffs in the county last year. These allowed a rigorously designed playback study that yielded very clear-cut results: 30% of normal Willow Warblers but 100% of Wiffwaffs respond to Chiffchaff song; Chiffchaffs rarely respond to Willow Warbler song but always recognise the Chiffchaff elements of Wiffwaff song.

I plan to follow this up with further studies this year. I am once again putting out the call for reports of mixed-singing Willow Warblers, especially those that include Chiffchaff notes in their song. Last year, with the help of members' reports, I found and recorded the songs of 15 mixed singing males in the county, mostly in the Cambridge area. These were sufficient to carry out a very informative playback study. This year I plan further studies designed to home in further on the reasons why some members of this species do this.

So please listen out for any off-sounding Willow Warbler or overly fast Chiffchaff song - it may turn out to be a mixed singer. I would again be extremely grateful to receive reports of such birds heard this spring: please send details of where and when as soon as you can to tonyfulford@gmail.com (or tel 0774 666 5195).

Friday 13th April at Cottenham Village College; 7.30 for 8.00pm start How our individual decisions collectively affect urban birds by Mark Fellowes

Today, we have become a truly urban society, with around 90% of British people living in towns and cities. Biodiversity, and our societies' connection with nature, is threatened by urbanisation, and our gardens provide a vital link between people and wildlife. In this talk, Mark will share his group's most recent research on how the decisions made by every garden owner affect the birds that share their gardens. We try to help birds by providing food and nest boxes, while at the same time we introduce their predators. What are the consequences of these decisions? Can we learn lessons that will help garden birds? From Blue Tits to Red kites, Grey Squirrels to domestic cats, each story provides insights into the unexpected consequences of our individual decisions.

Mark Fellowes is Professor of Ecology at the University of Reading. While here he will focus on birds, his research encompasses groups as diverse as leopards, fungal pathogens, grass-free lawns, aphids, and (after birds) the most interesting species on Earth, parasitoids. Mark's work has been widely featured in the print and broadcast media, including appearances on Autumnwatch and Countryfile Diaries. Friday 11th May at Cottenham Village College; 7.30 for 8.00pm start Social learning in Great Tits and Blue Tits – how birds use information about defended prey by Liisa Hämäläinen

Birds can gather information about their food from two sources, through personal experience and by observing the foraging behaviour of others (social information). Many insects have evolved chemical defences against predators and Liisa's research focuses on how birds use social information when learning to avoid these chemically defended prey. She uses Great Tits and Blue Tits as model predators and conducts learning experiments both in the wild, and with birds in captivity. She will present the results from these studies, describing how Great Tits and Blue Tits use social information in their food choice, and how this can influence the evolution of prey defences. Liisa Hämäläinen is a third year PhD student at the Department of Zoology, University of Cambridge, working in the behavioural ecology group.
